

How and why do we set aspirational targets?

- ► Target grades are used to foster ambition in students and are purposefully aspirational. We want our students to challenge themselves to be the best they can and be able to compete with their counterparts to achieve success in school and beyond.
- Based on the average GCSE grades.
- ► KS5 targets are initially set to ensure our students are achieving in the top 25% of the country before being personalised on a department and student level.
- ► A system call "ALPS" is used

What assessment data will you get as a parent?

PPE Grade (Pre Public Exam).
This may also appear as the CAG

The assessment grade based upon one summative assessment, given at one point in time. This recorded and reported twice per year.

PG (Predicted Grade)

This is the holistic grade indicating the flightpath of the learner by the end of the course in the final exam. This grade takes into account all previous assessments and classwork. This recorded and reported twice per year.

MEG (Minimum Expected Grade)
"target grade"

This is the target grade students are expected to achieve and is calculated using their GCSE results.



Student reflection

- ▶ It is crucial for students to take time to reflect on their achievements, consolidate what they have done well and plan for what they need to do better.
- ► After every data entry students receive their reports with the reflection questions on as an A4 sheet to keep and reflect on. The same reports are sent home via post and email (although from next year, we would like to just use email!)

Homework Guidelines

	Homework Guidelines	Per night
KS3	1 homework task per week for English, Maths, History, Geography, Science and Languages (20-30 minutes) 1 homework task per fortnight for creative subjects (20-30 minutes) 30 minutes reading per day	1 hr for Year 7 1.5 hours for Year 8/9
KS4	English 1 hour per week Maths 1 hour per week Science 1 hour per week (30 minutes per subject) Options subjects x 4 (1 hour per week) Independent revision, reading and study (2.5 hours per week) Total = 10 hours per week	2 hours
KS5	2 x homework tasks a week per subject (60 minutes) 10 hours independent study and reading Total= 16 hours per week	2.5 hours

Top tips for parents to support:

- > Have they got a quiet area in the home to complete the work?
- Have you discussed what homework is due?
- Have you discussed what the homework is about?
- ➤ Have you spent time with your children to understand whether they have completed the homework to the best of their ability?

Advice to Staff

- Sanctions for noncompletion
- ▶ If homework is not done the best strategy is to keep students back to complete the homework. Repeated non-completion of homework should be logged which will result in a central detention for the student.
- ▶ If a student continues to not complete homework a phone call home could be made. The CL and HOY should be informed. If this persists, the student may be placed on report

Advice to Parents

- Parental expectations for homework
- Please check and sign the student's planner weekly. Please ask to see the homework that has been completed.
- ► Engage in a dialogue with your child about the homework- ask your children to summarise their learning and "articulate their thinking". This really helps children to put learning into their long-term memory.
- Ask students to see their teacher before homework is handed in if they have any difficulties
- Create a space and time for completing homework at home.

What could parents do to support further?

- Continuously talk to your child about their future plans and encourage them to be ambitious, emphasizing how important their attendance, attitude towards learning and hard work is to achieve their aspirational goals.
- ► Talk to your child about their assessment grades and predictions after each data entry point. You receive this report via email and post but is also accessible on Go 4 Schools with your unique login and password. If you have any problems accessing Go4 Schools, please contact barnhilldatateam@Barnhill.School
- ► After each data entry point, students will have a reflection session with the form tutor where they set targets for their areas of development. Please discuss these reflections with your children.
- ► Look at the work and homework being completed in their books/digital book and feedback being given to them and discuss this with them.
- ► Ensure children come to school on time, fully equipped and ready to learn.
- Proactivity Students should always be encouraged to talk to teachers, ask questions, clarify misunderstandings, ask for help.
- Students' ownership Know the grades and ask, 'What do I need to do to improve?'
