Our weekly Science club is an exciting way for our students and enthusiasts to explore and engage with the world of science. The club provides an opportunity for individuals to learn about different scientific disciplines, conduct experiments, and participate in various scientific activities.

This term, our Barnhillians explored the digestive system of frogs in a hands-on way. The session was supported by our inspirational year 9 GAMA students, **Mateusz, Yohann, Devan, and Malay**, who acquired exceptional leadership skills. All students were able to enhance their scientific knowledge, develop critical thinking skills, and cultivate a passion for science.



‘STEPPE’-ING INTO HISTORY’

In order to complement part of our history course, ‘*Genghis Khan and the explosion from the steppes c.1167 – 1405*’, our history teachers, Miss Thomas and Mr Khan (no relation!) took our class to see the play ‘Mongol Khan’ in theatre.

The play was staged at the London Coliseum and delivered in Mongolian. During the two and a half hour production, we were afforded an insight into the culture and foundations of the Mongol Empire through puppetry, music and dance and lavish costumery. We were given a glimpse into the cultural practice of Shamism, a belief system that includes medicine, religion, a reverence of nature and ancestor worship where Sharmans were believed to have the ability to communicate with spirits. The play gave references to Temujin himself who later becomes more famously known as Genghis Khan and leader of the Mongol Empire.

Overall, everybody found the trip very entertaining, enjoyable and beneficial to the understanding of such a complex and secret history.

As the day progressed, the students found themselves immersed in hands-on activities featuring the enigmatic dry ice. This offered them a unique opportunity to put their newfound knowledge into practice through a series of engaging experiments. With bubbling enthusiasm, they eagerly investigated the mysteries of state changes, creating an atmosphere brimming with both fun and learning.

The joyous atmosphere was contagious, and it was evident that the entire experience was a hit among the students. Laughter and smiles filled the air as everyone revelled in the excitement of the day, making it not just a learning experience but a memorable and enjoyable one for all.

Students' testimonial:

I had an extremely intriguing and interesting experience during my recent dry-ice experiments. Although the 'singing' spoon experiment was fascinating and made me question the science behind it, my favourite activity was the 'Bubble Tray' experiment, where water and fairy soap mixed together to make bubbles, and dry ice was added to it.

I learned many new properties of the substance, such as sublimation, and refreshed my knowledge of covalent bonding. Several safety precautions were in place, such as wearing goggles and insulated gloves, to ensure our safety.

Overall, this experience enhanced my knowledge and engagement in scientific activities and Chemistry itself.
